With 14 rounds already in the rearview mirror, the grid heads to Budapest with contrasting objectives. Some are eyeing a well-earned breather, while others know there's serious homework waiting once the engines cool.

Oscar Piastri arrives with momentum on his side, having stretched out a 16-point cushion over McLaren teammate Lando Norris following a commanding display at Spa. The battle between the two Papaya teammates is heating up, but they won't have it all their own way.

Ferrari's recent upgrades appear to have hit the mark, injecting new life into their campaign. Meanwhile, Max Verstappen and Red Bull have reminded everyone they're still a threat, with flashes of the old dominance beginning to creep back in.

After a tough run, Mercedes will be desperate to rejoin the fight at the front, and Hungary could be their last chance to do so before the championship fight enters its second act.

McLaren's Oscar Piastri will be hoping to expand his lead at the top of the Drivers' Championship on Sunday as his battle for the title against teammate Lando Norris continues at the Hungarian GP.

Oscar Piastri finished ahead of Lando Norris at last week's Belgian Grand Prix to give McLaren a third successive one-two finish, albeit this time with the Australian taking the chequered flag ahead of the Brit.

Piastri passed Norris on the first leg of a rain-affected race at Spa to extend his lead at the top of the drivers' championship to 16 points ahead of this weekend's Hungarian Grand Prix. Ferrari's Charles Leclerc held of the challenge of Max Verstappen to finish third.

Charles Leclerc looked in sensational form as the Ferrari driver secured a surprise pole position in Saturday's qualifying session. The same could be said of Leclerc's Scuderia team-mate Lewis Hamilton, though, who could only record the 12th-best time, later describing himself as "absolutely useless".

McLaren pair Oscar Piastri and Lando Norris will be second and third on the grid respectively, with Mercedes' George Russell in fourth, followed by the Aston Martin pair Fernando Alonso and Lance Stroll. Max Verstappen is eighth after struggling again.

Norris was told by his race engineer to hand the lead back to Piastri, who had come to the Brit's aid at previous races, but for 20 laps Norris refused, before finally caving right at the last. Since the last Hungarian Grand Prix, Piastri and Norris have won seven races apiece, with the former scoring 409 points, and the latter 435. Crucially, however, it's Piastri who's 16 points better off this

If you've felt a sense of drift at Red Bull recently, it's reflected in the drivers' standings. Max Verstappen has made the podium once in the last five races, falling 65 points behind Norris and 81 behind Piastri,

while George Russell, the man who's expected to lose his seat to the Dutchman should he leave Red Bull, is gaining rapidly.

The Hungarian Grand Prix is the final race before F1's two-week summer shutdown, and with Oscar Piastri 16 points ahead of Lando Norris going into the weekend, it's an opportunity for the Australian to inflict an almighty psychological blow upon his teammate.

Piastri leads Norris by 16 points following last weekend's rain-delayed Belgian GP, which saw the Australian lead from the first lap and hold on to claim his sixth victory of the season.
